How to apply for a residency





About our residencies

We want to work with and support artists. One way we can do this is by having residencies for artists.



A **residency** is a chance for an artist to work on their ideas.



For the residency we can give artists:

money



studio space to work in



equipment



help and advice





We have 2 types of residency that artists can now apply for.



Type 1 - Discover residency

We will give 8 artists £5,000 each to work on their ideas.



Artists will get 10 working days spread across 2 months to work in a studio.



Type 2 - **Develop residency**

We will give 4 artists £20,000 each to work on their ideas.



Artists will get 30 working days spread across 6 months to work in a studio.





What we are looking for

When you apply for a residency we will ask you to tell us about your work.



To get a residency your work or idea should involve 1 or more of these things:



climate justice

For example, changes to the weather, pollution, damage to animals or plants. Thinking about how these things affect people.



 being joyful and uplifting for audiences. This means your work is fun to watch and makes people really happy





 touring to remote village halls across the whole of Scotland. This means they are usually in hard to reach places or far away from large cities



using new technology



is made by people with South Asian heritage



 is made by artists who are disabled, Deaf, neurodivergent, or have experienced long-term illness or mental ill health

- try out a new ideaand
- work out how to turn a new idea into a project

The £5,000 we give each residency will pay for:



 lead artist fee. This is for 2 weeks of their time



project costs and materials



The work should take 2 weeks altogether but can be spread over 2 months.



For example, you could work Monday to Friday for 2 weeks **or** single days spread out over 2 months.



The work must be done between:

May to June 2022 or January to February 2023



More about our Develop residency



This residency is for artists who want to work on an idea to first draft stage.

Then the work will be shared with other people who work in the arts.

For example, producers and promotors who can help you to show your work to more people.



This residency could be for:

- an individual artist or
- a group of artists known as a collective or company



The residencies will all end with a **sharing.**

This means showing people your draft work. They will give you feedback and talk to you about what you have made so far.



How to apply





There are 2 parts for applying for this residency.



First you need to tell us why you are interested in a residency.

We will look at everyone who told us they were interested in the residency.

We will choose which ideas and artists we want to know more about. This is called **shortlisting**.





We will ask artists who are shortlisted to fill in an application form in **May 2022**. We will support artists to fill in the form.



We will give them £130 and a meeting with our team who help artists with their ideas.



The £20,000 we give each residency will pay for:

lead artist fee. This is for 6 weeks of their time



 other people you may need to work with



project costs and materials





The work should take 6 weeks altogether but can be spread over 6 months.



The work must be done between **July 2022** and **March 2023**.

Support for Artists



All residencies have:

 rehearsal space, at Rockvilla in Glasgow, or somewhere local to the artists



 meetings with experts from our team to plan the work

This includes help with things like lighting, sound and using digital technology.





 help with telling people about your work. This is called marketing



 advice about how to show your work to people around Scotland.
This is called **touring**



 advice about how to find the money you need to do your work in the future



 extra money to help with access needs. For example, an interpreter

Who can apply for residencies

The residencies are for artists who:

work in any art form



 want to create a new live performance. This could be digital, online work, or a mix of both

For example, performance and theatre makers who want to show work in a digital format.



have been paid to make art before



live or work in Scotland and are 18 years or older





We welcome applications from:

people we have not worked with before



 people who are early in their career and people who are an artist but in a new role. For example, an actor who has recently become a playwright



 people of all genders and sexualities and part of LGBTQ2SIA+



 people who are from all parts of the world and who may have experienced racism.

Racism is unjust treatment of a person based on their race, ethnicity or colour of their skin

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people who are from Black, Brown, People of Colour, from the African Diaspora, Caribbean Diaspora, East Asian Diaspora, South East Asian Diaspora, South Asian Diaspora, West Asian and Middle East Diaspora, Latinx/ Latine, Indigenous People, bi-racial / multiple heritage



People who have heritage from an area in the world and live outside of their ancestral homeland is called Diaspora.



 people who are disabled, Deaf, neurodivergent, have a long-term illness or mental ill health



 people from low-income households



 people who speak one of Scotland's minority languages.
For example, Scots or Gaelic



We are unlikely to choose artists who:



 have been a lead artist in a National Theatre of Scotland production



are in full-time education



- have had more than 3 artistic works that have each been:
- shown to more than 250 people for at least 1 week in a venue / cinema / TV / online

and



 have been paid for by a venue or company from the beginning of the project all the way through to final production being shown to people.

This is called a **commission** or a project that **has been fully commissioned**



Choosing artists for the residency



A group of people called a panel decide which artists will get a residency.



The panel will:

- read every application
- look at the things you send with your application form
- make their decision as a group



The panel are looking for 2 main things:

 That your idea fits with the things we are looking for and is new and interesting.

The list of what we are looking for is on page 4 and page 5.
